A. Approval of Minutes

Members were asked to approve the minutes of the June 16, 2022 meeting.

Motion

David G. Kline made a motion to approve the minutes and it was seconded by William B. Judge. The motion was unanimously approved by a voice vote.

III. Staff Reports

A. Financial Progress Report

Curtis Baker presented Attachment 3A.

Bobbie Beshara asked whether the consulting firm to be hired by AMATS to conduct area Pavement Condition Indexes (PCIs) would take core samples. Mr. Baker said that samples are usually not taken by a PCI consultant, but communities may relay concerns and related documentation to AMATS, which the agency would then relay to a consultant for consideration as part of the consultant's index compilation. Mr. Baker said that he could discuss the issue further with Ms. Beshara.

Motion

Linda Clark made a motion to approve the Financial Progress Report and it was seconded by Bill Goncy. The motion was unanimously approved by a voice vote.

B. Technical Progress Report

Mr. Baker said that preparations are underway for the 2022 AMATS Annual Meeting scheduled for Friday, Oct. 7, 2022 at the Sheraton Suites in Cuyahoga Falls.

Mr. Baker said that three RAISE grant recipients in Ohio were announced. **Mr. Baker** said that AMATS area applicants may seek RAISE grants next year.

C. AMATS Federal Funds Report

David Pulay presented Attachment 3C.

Mr. Pulay presented tables concerning STBG, CRRSAA, CMAQ, TASA and CRP Funding Program and Balances dated July 18, 2022.

Mr. Pulay said that the new Carbon Reduction Program (CRP) will fund a wide range of projects designed to reduce carbon dioxide emissions from on-road highway sources. **Mr.** Pulay said that eligible projects will include on- and offroad trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists and other non-motorized forms of transportation and projects that support the deployment of alternative fuel vehicles.

Mr. Pulay praised AMATS Engineer Amy Prater for her diligent work in rescheduling various resurfacing projects from FYs 2026, 2027 and 2028 to FY 2024 based on PCIs. These project schedule changes resulted from the cancellation of the SUM-Seiberling Way Phase 1 (PID #84397) project in Akron in FY 2024.

Robert Finney asked whether the TAC TIP Subcommittee would review the CRP funding guidelines. **Mr. Baker** said yes.

IV. Old Business

A. Final Draft Resiliency Report.

David Swirsky presented Attachment 4A.

Mayor Adamson asked how the report would be utilized by AMATS. Mr. Baker said that the report would be used by the agency as an input during the development of the next long-range regional transportation plan. Mr. Baker noted that the creation of such a report is encouraged by the federal government. Mr. Baker said that the report could be used by AMATS and its member communities in the consideration and awarding of points for project funding, especially with regards to those projects in floodplain areas.

Motion

Jim Bowling made a motion to approve the AMATS Climate Resiliency Report and it was seconded **Bobbie Beshara**. The motion was approved.

Paul Adamson made a motion to approve Resolution 2022-14 and it was seconded **Linda Clark**. The motion was approved.

B. Resolution 2022-15 – Approving Amendment #20 to the FY 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program to delete an existing project and revise the funding of an existing project.

Mr. Pulay presented Attachment 6B.

Mr. Baker praised the member communities for fulfilling their commitments under the AMATS Project Delivery Incentive Program (PDIP). Mr. Baker noted how effective the PDIP has been in its first utilization.

Motion

William B. Judge made a motion to approve Resolution 2022-15 and it was seconded by *Bill Goncy*. The motion was approved.

C. Resolution 2022-16 – Adopting a Goal of Zero Fatalities and Serious Injuries by 2050 for the AMATS Area.

Mr. Pulay presented Attachment 6C.

Joe Paradise expressed concerns about implementing the goals of the *Vision Zero* initiative within the Greater Akron area. Mr. Paradise asked who would oversee the program in the area. Mr. Baker explained that the initiative was not a program, but would entail the development of a plan led by an interdisciplinary steering committee.

Mr. Paradise questioned as to whether the initiative would ultimately lead to AMATS questioning area law enforcement officials as to how they enforce traffic

laws in the pursuit of zero fatalities. **Mr. Baker** stated that the initiative would utilize an interdisciplinary approach in the formation of its steering committee as urged by the Safe Streets for All (SS4A) Program.

Mr. Paradise questioned whether the goal of zero fatalities was realistic. **Mr. Paradise** expressed concerns about the length of the *Vision Zero*'s horizon year of 2050. **Mr. Paradise** urged a shorter time frame for the initiative with an achievable goal in terms of fatality reduction.

Mayor Adamson asked whether the *Vision Zero* initiative would pose a financial burden on AMATS. **Mr. Baker** said no and explained that many of the data collection strategies encouraged by federal officials under the *Vision Zero* initiative are already undertaken by the agency.

Mr. Pulay noted that the interdisciplinary steering committee would likely include law enforcement officials who could identify and suggest workable approaches to AMATS.

Mr. Paradise said that, in his opinion, making the use of cell phones while driving a primary offense would result in significant accident reductions, but noted that there is a lack of political commitment on the part of the state legislature to make such usage illegal.

The attendees discussed the potential effectiveness of the *Vision Zero* initiative within the Greater Akron area.

Mayor Clark noted that the Village of Mantua has distracted driving laws that it enforces.

Motion

Bobbie Beshara made a motion to approve Resolution 2022-16 and it was seconded by **Jim Bowling**. <u>The motion was approved</u>. **Joe Paradise** voted "No" on the motion to approve.

Mr. Hadley asked whether each MPO in Ohio would develop their own *Vision Zero* plan that ODOT would use to compile a plan for the state. **Mr. Baker** noted that *Vision Zero* is not an ODOT, but a federal initiative. **Mr. Baker** said that the AMATS Policy Committee decided that AMATS should develop a regional safety plan for its first *Vision Zero* endeavor. **Mr. Baker** said that other MPOs may opt to pursue different strategies.

Joe Paradise expressed concerns as to whether the stated goals of *Vision Zero* were attainable. Mr. Paradise stated that a political commitment by local and state officials may be required to meet the goals of *Vision Zero*. Mr. Paradise questioned whether the *Vision Zero* horizon year of 2050 was realistic. Mr. Baker explained that the year was selected as it coincides with the horizon year of the AMATS long-range regional transportation plan.

Motion

Jim Bowling made a motion to approve Resolution 2022-16 and it was seconded by Amy Mohr. The motion was approved. Joe Paradise voted "No" on the motion to approve.

I. Welcome

Curtis Baker welcomed the AMATS Citizens Involvement Committee (CIC) meeting attendees. Introductions were made among the attendees.

II. <u>Discussion Items</u>

A. David Pulay presented Attachment 6C – Resolution 2022-16 – Adopting a Goal of Zero Fatalities and Serious Injuries by 2050 for the AMATS Area.

Danny Durst asked what measures were most effective to reduce congestion and non-occupancy vehicle use. **Mr. Gardner** explained that telecommuting, ridesharing, and transit were all viable options to help reduce congestion. **Mr. Durst** questioned if any of those options alone without major societal shifts could impact congestion. **Mr. Baker** acknowledged that many decisions regarding land use and transportation make reducing congestion and single-occupancy vehicles a challenge.

- C. Mr. Rau asked how AMATS will allocate federal Carbon Reduction Program (CRP) grants. Mr. Baker responded that AMATS had not yet determined the best way to allocate CRP funds.
- **D. Mr. Rau** asked if AMATS was aware of a proposed transmission line project by FirstEnergy Corp. that may present opportunities for bicycle and pedestrian projects. **Mr. Rau** asked if the transmission line could impact trail projects that have existing funding from AMATS. **Mr. Baker** said that the agency was aware of the transmission line, but was uncertain as to its potential impacts on AMATS-funded projects.
- E. Mr. Rau asked if the Staff had opinions on the best way for pedestrians and cyclists to cross state Route 8 near Portage Trail and Broad Boulevard. Mr. Rau suggested the installation of a new tunnel or a bridge to connect to the Veterans Trail. Mr. Pulay discussed the challenges of developing new infrastructure in that area and recommended that pedestrians and cyclists use the existing Portage Trail Bridge for access.

III. Adjournment

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned.

The next meeting of the CIC is scheduled for **6:30 p.m.** on **Thursday**, **September 15, 2022**.

AMATS will be administering a new fund called The Carbon Reduction Program that is designated to fund a wide range of projects that reduce carbon dioxide emissions from on-road highway sources. Eligible projects include on- and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists and other nonmotorized forms of transportation and projects that support the deployment of alternative fuel vehicles. Since the program was supposed to be deployed in FY 2022 the funding for FY 2023 is double the amount of the following years. We anticipate having \$2.5 million in FY 2023 and then \$1.3 million the following years through FY 2026.

Since a significant portion of the new federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) is in the form of discretionary funding, we would like to make you aware of a grants website that has been developed by ODOT. It can be overwhelming trying to determine which grant is best suited for a certain project. The ODOT's grants website can help and the link is:

This website has a very informative document that can be downloaded that explains the various Discretionary Grant Opportunities. It also has a form that can be submitted to request a letter of support and lists current and future grant solicitation schedules.

Executive Summary

This memorandum discusses a TIP amendment to add recently awarded funding to the program of projects for both METRO RTA and PARTA.

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) has awarded METRO RTA and PARTA funding through its Ohio Transit Partnership Program (OTP2). This competitive grant program was established to provide additional capital funding to Ohio's public transit operators for projects emphasizing system preservation. In August, METRO and PARTA were awarded funds through this program for inclusion in FY 2023 of the AMATS Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). METRO received \$1,587,200 in federal funds. And PARTA received \$324,000 in federal funds. The source of the OTP2 funds is state-attributable Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) Program and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program funds.

In addition, METRO received \$616,000 in competitive federal funds from the FTA Low or No Emission Vehicle Program (FTA Section 5339c). And PARTA received \$1,514,888 in federal discretionary funds from the FTA Bus and Bus Facilities Program (FTA Section 5339b).

Consequently, METRO and PARTA are requesting that these additional funds be added to the TIP to include the recently awarded federal and state projects.

METRO RTA is requesting the following changes to the TIP:

- Add a Bus Replacement Project – Two Electric Buses (PID 117673)

METRO RTA requests the addition of \$616,000 in FTA Section 5339c discretionary funds awarded through the Low or No Emission Vehicle Program, for the acquisition of two large electric buses. METRO also intends to use \$916,281 in federal funds from the

area's FTA Section 5307 allocation. Local share contribution is \$375,800. The total cost of the two electric buses is \$1,908,081, to be scheduled in FY 2023.

- Revise the Year and Funding for the Design of a new Maintenance and Operations Facility (PID 104366)

This project entails the design of a new maintenance and operations facility located at 416 Kenmore Boulevard in Akron (METRO's main facility). METRO is requesting to revise the federal funds used for this project. The amount of FTA Section 5339 Bus and Bus Facilities Program funding will be reduced from \$966,910 to \$393,927. Funding currently includes \$500,000 in state General Revenue Funds (GRF) awarded through the OTP2 Program last year. The total cost for the design of the new facility will be approximately \$3,106,500, to be scheduled in FY 2023.

- Revise the Year and Funding for the Construction of a new Maintenance and Operations Facility (PID 104366)

This project entails the construction of the maintenance and operations facility discussed above. Federal funds for this project include \$7,782,542 in AMATS area FTA Section 5307 funds and \$1,449,984 in AMATS area FTA Section 5339 funds. These federal funds will be matched with \$10,503,914 in local funds generated from METRO's Summit County sales tax. The project is to be scheduled in FYs 2023 and 2024. The total project cost for the construction of this project over two years is \$19,736,440.

- Revise the Year and Funding for a Large Bus Replacement Project – Eight CNG and Two Electric Buses (PID 112270)

METRO is requesting that the total budget for this existing project be reduced and rescheduled from FY 2022 to 2023. The amount of federal funds from the area's FTA Section 5307 allocation will be reduced. The project entails the purchase of eight large Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) buses and two large electric buses. METRO's local share funding match will be \$1,165,636. The total cost for the ten large buses will be approximately \$6,804,219, to be rescheduled to FY 2023.

- Add Preventive Maintenance Funding (PID 104364)

METRO RTA requests the addition of \$856,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded recently by ODOT through their OTP2 Program, to METRO's existing preventive maintenance project scheduled in FY 2023. The local share contribution is \$214,000, to match the awarded amount.

- Add Two Computer Hardware Projects (PID 117675)

METRO RTA requests the addition of \$235,200 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded recently through ODOT's OTP2 Program, for two computer hardware projects to be scheduled in FY 2023. The local share contribution is \$58,800. The total cost for the two projects is \$294,000.

- Add a Computer Software Project (PID 117675)

METRO RTA requests the addition of \$200,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded recently through the OTP2 Program, for a computer software project to be scheduled in FY 2023. The local share contribution is \$50,000. The total cost for this project is \$250,000.

- Add a CNG Compressor Project (PID 117675)

METRO RTA is requesting the addition of \$120,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded recently through the OTP2 Program, for a Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) rehabilitation project to be scheduled in FY 2023. The local share contribution is \$30,000. The total cost for this project is \$150,000.

- Add a Portable Lift Project (PID 117675)

METRO RTA requests the addition of \$128,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded recently through the OTP2 Program, for a portable vehicle lift project to be scheduled in FY 2023. The local share contribution is \$32,000. The total cost for this project is \$160,000.

- Add a Facility Concrete Rehabilitation Project (PID 117675)

METRO RTA requests the addition of \$48,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded recently through the OTP2 Program, for a concrete rehabilitation project to be scheduled in FY 2023. The local share contribution is \$12,000. The total cost for this project is \$60,000.

PARTA is requesting the following changes to the TIP:

- Add an Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) Computer Hardware Project (PID 117660)

PARTA requests the addition of \$30,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded through the OTP2 Program, for the acquisition of computer hardware. The local share contribution is \$20,000. The total project cost is \$50,000 (60 percent federal), scheduled in FY 2023.

- Add an ITS Computer Software Project (PID 117660)

PARTA requests the addition of \$60,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded through the OTP2 Program, for the acquisition of computer software. The local share contribution is \$40,000. The total project cost is \$100,000 (60 percent federal), scheduled in FY 2023.

- Add an Equipment - Ancillary Vehicle Project (PID 117660)

PARTA requests the addition of \$146,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded through the OTP2 Program, for the acquisition of two support trucks and one

administrative support vehicle. The local share contribution is \$36,500. The total project cost is \$182,500 (80 percent federal), scheduled in FY 2023.

- Add Funds to Preventive Maintenance for Building Repair (PID 111792)

PARTA requests the addition of \$88,000 in state-attributable STBG funds awarded through the OTP2 Program, for the maintenance and repair of their administrative facility. The local share contribution is \$22,000. The total project cost is \$110,000 (80 percent federal), scheduled in FY 2023.

- Add Funding and Revise the Year for a Large Bus Replacement Project (PID 111799)

This existing PARTA project will add recently awarded FTA discretionary Bus and Bus Facilities (5339b) program funds (\$1,514,888) for the purchase of four large clean diesel buses. This competitive grant award will replace the Akron Urbanized area Section 5307 formula funds currently programmed for this project. PARTA's local share funding match will be \$378,720. The total project cost is \$1,893,608 (80 percent federal), to be rescheduled for FY 2024, and combined with PID 111805. This consolidation will result in the elimination of PID 111805.

STAFF COMMENTS

As with all TIP amendments, considerations with respect to consistency with the Regional Transportation Plan, financial capability, air quality conformity, public involvement, and environmental justice are important.

Regional Transportation Plan

The projects proposed in this amendment are consistent with *Transportation Outlook*, the area's Regional Transportation Plan.

Financial Capability

With respect to financial capability, there are sufficient funds available for this amendment.

Air Quality

The project can be viewed as either exempt from air quality or has been analyzed as part of the air quality networks and has resulted in a finding of compliance with the Clean Air Act. Therefore, this amendment will not affect adversely the air quality conformity approval of *Transportation Outlook* or the TIP.

Public Involvement

The Staff is recommending that the Policy Committee consider this action as not regionally significant. As a result, the modified procedures in the AMATS *Public Participation Plan* are appropriate.

Environmental Justice

Executive Order 12898: Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low Income Populations states that, "each federal agency shall make achieving environmental justice part of its mission by identifying and addressing as appropriate, disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects of its programs policies and activities on minority and low-income populations." This requirement also applies to recipients of federal funds, such as METRO RTA and PARTA.

The project that will result from this TIP amendment does not appear to impose disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects on minorities and/or low-income people who reside in the METRO RTA or PARTA service areas.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Attached to this memo is Resolution 2022-17. This resolution approves the requested changes to FYs 2023 and 2024 of the AMATS Transportation Improvement Program as described above. The Staff recommends approval.

The following nine resurfacing projects are being added to the FY 2021-2024 TIP to take advantage of funds that became available when a large project, Seiberling Way Phase 1, was cancelled in amendment 20 as presented at the August AMATS meetings. This cancellation released \$4.1 million of STBG funds in FY 2024. The nine resurfacing projects were selected based on Pavement Condition Index (PCI) scores and project readiness. All the projects were in the Project Development Incentive Program (PDIP) and were temporarily scheduled in FY 2027 and FY 2028 until funds became available to advance them. The projects in the list below are being moved into FY 2024 and the funding amounts refer to STBG funds.

POR-FROST RD PHASE 2 (116470) – Streetsboro, from 240 feet east of SR 43 to Page Rd; \$461,835 **POR-S PROSPECT ST** (117057) – Ravenna, from the south corporation line to Main St (SR 59); \$247,500

SUM-CLEVELAND MASSILLON RD (117065) – Norton, from I-76 to the north corporation line; \$787,500

SUM-HIGHLAND RD (116479) – Twinsburg, from Hadden Rd to Darrow Rd (SR 91); \$522,000 **SUM-S MAIN ST** (117105) – New Franklin/Green, from south of W Caston Rd to E Turkeyfoot Rd (SR 619); \$787,500

SUM-MILLER RD (116539) – Akron/Fairlawn, from Ridgewood Rd to W Market St (SR 18); \$409,500 **SUM-NORTON AVE** (116962) – Barberton, from the west corporation line to Barber Rd; \$499,662 **SUM-VALLEYVIEW RD** (116932) – Hudson, from Darrow Rd (SR 91) to the north corporation line; \$787,500

The following two projects are being added to the FY 2021-2024 TIP so early stages of project development such as right of way and engineering can begin.

SUM-IR 76-6.15 (100713) – Is a significant project on the portion of I-76 that is referred to as the "Kenmore Leg" in Akron. The project will include capacity and safety improvements, noise walls, and structural rehabilitation. Right of way is being added in FY 2023 using \$45,000 of federal funds and \$5,000 of state funds. The total project cost is over \$106 million. Construction is expected to begin in FY 2026.

WAY-HEARTLAND TRAIL PHASE 4A (116841)— Is a multipurpose trail project in Chippewa Twp in Wayne County. The new trail is being constructed on an abandoned railroad bed and is 1.10 miles long. It runs from Marshallville to Coal Bank Road. Engineering is being added to FY 2023 using \$68,100 of CMAQ funds and \$17,000 of local funds. Construction is scheduled in FY 2026 but may move up as the project develops.

The following two resurfacing projects in Ravenna are being combined into one project for economies of scale and more efficient project management. The combined project will use PID 115360. Construction is scheduled in FY 2024.

STAFF COMMENTS

Sufficient funding is forecasted from federal and state sources for this amendment. The project listed meets all amendment requirements mentioned above. Therefore, this amendment does not cause any negative impact.

This memorandum discusses the status of activities and expenditures for transportation planning in the Akron Metropolitan Area for the state fiscal year ending June 30, 2022. The purpose of this resolution is to approve the Fiscal Year 2022 Year End Completion Report for transmittal to ODOT.

Each year AMATS prepares a Transportation Planning Work Program that is the basis for federal financial assistance for planning. ODOT requires AMATS, following the close of each fiscal year (June 30), to review the previous year's Work Program and compare the scope of work that was originally proposed to that which was completed. Completion of the Work Program is a prerequisite for certification of the planning process. This memorandum summarizes the Fiscal Year 2022 Year End Completion Report. The planning work necessary for FY 2022 was completed, and the expenditures were within the budgeted amounts. All items were completed by the end of the fiscal year on June 30, with few exceptions due to the COVID-19 pandemic and staffing issues.

Upon approval, this report will be submitted to the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT).

Attached is a financial summary of the Fiscal Year 2022 Year End Completion Report for all of the work elements scheduled during FY 2022. A number of significant products and activities were completed during FY 2022. These include:

- 1. Maintained the FY 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program as amended
- 2. Maintained the Congestion Management Process and created the new Annual Congestion Report
- 3. Participated in the Statewide CMAQ Discretionary Funds Program
- 4. Monitored projects that use federal funds sub-allocated to AMATS
- 5. Maintained the current Regional Transportation Plan: *Transportation Outlook 2045* in accordance with the goals established in *AccessOhio 2045*, Ohio's New Statewide Transportation Plan
- 6. The Traffic Crashes and Safety Performance Measures (2018-2020) Technical

- Memorandum
- 7. 2021 AMATS Annual Report
- 8. Promoted commuter alternatives through bicycle and pedestrian advocacy in line with *Walk.Bike.Ohio*, Ohio's first statewide bicycle and pedestrian plan
- 9. Management of the Gohio Commute Program
- 10. Continued the Pavement Condition Data Collection and Analysis Program
- 11. Updated the regional ITS Architecture
- 12. Continued implementation of performance measures as part of the Plan and TIP processes consistent with the FAST Act

Because AMATS is well within budget, funds were able to be carried over from FY 2022. These funds total approximately \$456,600 (see the attached summary table) and must be expended by December 31, 2022.

Attached is Resolution Number 2022-19 approving the FY 2022 Year End Completion Report and authorizing its submission to ODOT and USDOT as evidence of completing the FY 2022 Transportation Planning Work Program. All work elements remain within budget. The Staff recommends approval.
