

#### I. Call to Order

- **A. Mayor David Kline** called the meeting to order in Grand Ballroom B of the Quaker Square Inn. The attending members constituted a quorum.
- **B.** Audience Participation

None.

#### II. Minutes – Motion Required

#### A. Approval of Minutes

Members were asked to approve the minutes of the September 25, 2014 meeting.

#### Motion |

William A. Currin made a motion to approve the minutes and it was seconded by Bill Goncy. The motion was approved by a voice vote.

#### III. Staff Reports

#### A. Financial Progress Report

**Jason Segedy** presented Attachment 3A.

#### Motion

Joe Paradise made a motion to approve the Financial Progress Report and it was seconded by David Gasper. The motion was approved by a voice vote.

#### **B.** Technical Progress Report

**Curtis Baker** summarized developments concerning a recently enacted \$1.1 trillion federal transportation spending bill approved by Congress and signed by President Obama. The law ensures that there will be USDOT funding through FY 2015 and that the Greater Akron area's federal funding levels will remain about the same. Another round of TIGER funding will be available for applicants through the legislation. **Mr. Baker** said that MAP-21 is scheduled to expire in

May 2015 and noted that Congress is considering raising the gas tax in light of falling fuel prices.

**Mr. Baker** described the changes to the Citizens Involvement Committee (CIC) that were enacted by the CIC during its Dec. 11 meeting. Changes included suspending the committee's bylaws, membership changes, a quarterly meeting calendar, and content-based meetings focusing on topical subjects. **Mr. Baker** said that the changes were made to foster public involvement and will be included in the upcoming update of the AMATS *Public Participation Plan*.

**Mr. Baker** said that the Staff is developing a Road-Diet Analysis for Portage and Summit counties. **Mr. Baker** said that the analysis would dovetail the AMATS *Mid-Block Crossing Analysis*, which would be discussed later during the meeting.

**Mr. Baker** said that AMATS was recently recognized for its Connecting Communities Program by Transportation for America in its report entitled *The Innovative MPO: Smart Planning, Strong Communities*.

#### C. AMATS Federal Funds Report

**Victor Botosan** presented Attachment 3C and tables concerning Funding Program and Balances dated December 1, 2014.

**Mr. Botosan** noted that AMATS was one of three MPOs in Ohio that successfully carried forward less funding than the established thresholds. **Mr. Botosan** explained that the remaining MPOs that exceeded the thresholds had their funds recalled and redistributed to the MPOs that met ODOT policy. **Mr. Botosan** said that this redistribution amounted to an additional \$580,000 to AMATS.

**Mr. Botosan** said that AMATS will not be formally involved with the PCR Update process, but added that the Summit County Engineer's Office is still proceeding with the collection of this data. Any community is welcome to join the county's contract to reduce individual costs.

**Mr. Botosan** referred to the attached Statewide CMAQ Funding Program - AMATS Project Priorities 2014 table. **Mr. Botosan** said that the statewide CMAQ Committee selected the top three projects in the table to receive funding. The Staff will present a resolution to the Policy Committee for formal approval in January 2015.

The Staff will present the FY 2016-2019 TIP - First Draft Projects List in January.

#### V. New Business

#### A. District-Wide School Travel Plan for Akron Public Schools.

**Phyllis Jividen** presented Attachment 5A.

Christopher Mallin asked for a clarification as to what the Policy Committee was approving with regards to this plan. Mr. Segedy explained that the motion before the committee would not authorize or commit additional funding to this plan, but represented an endorsement of the plan. David Gasper explained that the city of Akron is seeking endorsements of the plan so that it can pursue sources of funding for its implementation.

**Mayor Currin** asked what funding sources that Akron would seek for plan implementation. **Andy Davis** described the various state and federal funding programs available to implement the plan.

#### **Motion**

Glenn Broska made a motion to approve the District-Wide School Travel Plan for Akron Public Schools and it was seconded by Bobbie Beshara. <u>The motion</u> was approved by a voice vote.

#### B. Adopting the AMATS Mid-Block Crossing Analysis.

Nate Brugler presented Attachment 5B.

**Joe Paradise** expressed concerns about the development of mid-block crossings with regards to driver and pedestrian safety and the issue of legal liability of project sponsors in the event of accidents as they are responsible for striping.

**Mr. Paradise** questioned the inclusion of Location #20 - Medina Road/SR 18 in Bath and Copley Townships in the list of *Potential Mid-Block Crossing Locations*. **Mr. Paradise** noted that mid-block crossings may be more effective in areas of two-lane traffic rather than several lanes of high-speed traffic as is the case in the Montrose area.

**Mr. Paradise** urged the exploration of alternatives and careful scrutiny of midblock crossings before such crossings are developed. **Mr. Paradise** criticized the pursuit of mid-block crossings as bad policy which should be discouraged and stated that he would vote against adoption of the analysis.

**Mayor Beshara** asked if the analysis should state the agency's intent of improving safety at locations such as Montrose while clarifying questions of liability. **Mr. Segedy** added that the analysis identifies locations where communities may want to consider adding mid-block crossings. **Mr. Segedy** explained that communities would be responsible for conducting the due diligence necessary to determine if crossings are warranted at potential locations.

With regards to the Montrose area, **Mr. Segedy** noted that AMATS recently worked with Bath and Copley townships, ODOT and the Summit County Engineer's Office to include non-mid-block crosswalk locations into the department's resurfacing project for SR 18 in the Montrose area. **Mr. Segedy** said that there will be crosswalk improvements at Springside Drive, the entrance to Acme Fresh Market No. 15, and Cleveland-Massillon Road next year. **Mr. Segedy** said that currently there are no plans to construct a mid-block crossing in the Montrose area, but inclusion on the list may prompt consideration of a project in the future.

There was discussion regarding the purpose of the analysis as a resource in the planning process.

#### **Motion**

Glenn Broska made a motion to approve the AMATS Mid-Block Crossing Analysis and it was seconded by John Trew. The motion was approved by a voice vote with Joe Paradise voting "No."

C. Presentation by Nichole Booker, Ph.D., Senior Director, Collective Impact at United Way of Summit County - *Poverty and Transportation*.

Mr. Segedy introduced Director Booker.

**Director Booker** described the relationship between transportation access and poverty. **Director Booker** noted that, according to the FTA, two-thirds of the nation's new job growth on average is located in suburbs while three-quarters of qualified human capital live in central urban cores. This situation results in a combination of long public transit commutes with multiple transfers for many workers while many would-be hires remain jobless due to a lack of accessible transportation.

**Director Booker** observed that there are three approaches that government policies could embrace to bridge transportation gaps: working across policies and systems; pushing for inclusive planning; and broadening planning perspectives through which problems are viewed. **Director Booker** described each approach and presented examples.

There was discussion regarding the approaches that Director Booker described in her presentation.

**Mayor Bollas** asked if there was a tenant on the land in the area of the White Pond Parkway project (PID# 99051) as listed in Amendment #16. **Mr. Segedy** noted that the area of the project is zoned for office and commercial use.

#### **Motion**

Joe Paradise made a motion to approve Resolution 2014-16 and it was seconded by David Gasper. The motion was approved by a voice vote.

B. Resolution 2014-17 – Approving FY 2015 Elderly and Disabled Program Project Recommendations (Amendment #17).

Jeff Gardner presented Attachment 6B.

**Mr. Mallin** asked if the federal funds mentioned in the attachment would be used for vehicle purchases only rather than for infrastructure needs. **Mr. Gardner** said that the funds would also be used to purchase scheduling software and computer hardware.

**Mr. Mallin** asked for information regarding the funding source for these purchases. **Mr. Gardner** said that funding is provided by the FTA's Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Program.

#### Motion

Christopher Mallin made a motion to approve Resolution 2014-17 and it was seconded by Frank Hairston. The motion was approved by a voice vote.

C. Resolution 2014-18 – Amending the Transportation Improvement Program FY 2014-2017 To Add and Revise Funds in FY 2015 for PARTA Capital Projects (Amendment #18).

Mr. Gardner presented Attachment 6C.

**David White** made a motion to approve the District-Wide School Travel Plan for Akron Public Schools and it was seconded by **David Gasper**. The motion was approved by a voice vote.

**Mr. Segedy** expressed his belief that the Akron STP represents a "best practice" in terms of planning for the region. **Mr. Segedy** encouraged the TAC members to read the report and identify aspects of it that may be relevant to their respective communities. **David Gasper** added that the team that prepared the Akron STP put forth a comprehensive effort in its development.

#### B. Adopting the AMATS Mid-Block Crossing Analysis.

Nate Brugler presented Attachment 5B.

**Mr. Segedy** praised Mr. Brugler and the Staff for the development of the analysis, which represents a first-of-its-kind study for the region and would prove to be a sound information resource for communities.

**Mr. White** asked what would be the funding source to implement such projects. **Mr. Segedy** said that they would likely be eligible for STP or TA funds.

**Joe Paradise** expressed concerns about the development of mid-block crossings with regards to driver and pedestrian safety. **Mr. Segedy** explained that the analysis represents a planning tool and that the agency is not necessarily recommending a project at every location identified in the analysis' list of *Potential Mid-Block Crossing Locations*. #### I. Call to Order

**Curtis Baker** called the meeting to order. The attending members constituted a quorum.

#### II. <u>Minutes – Motion Required</u>

#### A. Approval of Minutes

Members were asked to approve the minutes of the September 18, 2014 meeting.

#### Motion

**Dustin J. Baker** made a motion to approve the minutes and it was seconded by **William J. Maki**. The motion was approved by a voice vote.

#### III. Staff Reports

#### A. Technical Progress Report

**Mr. C. Baker** said that AMATS was recently recognized for its Connecting Communities Program by Transportation for America in its report entitled *The Innovative MPO: Smart Planning, Strong Communities.* 

**Mr.** C. **Baker** said that the Staff is developing a Road-Diet Analysis for the Greater Akron area.

Mr. C. Baker summarized developments concerning a \$1.1 trillion federal transportation spending bill currently being debated by Congress. Mr. C. Baker said that current funding levels for AMATS would remain unchanged through Fiscal Year 2015 under the proposed legislation. The legislation would also continue the TIGER Grant Program. William J. Maki asked if there are area applications to the TIGER Program pending. Mr. C. Baker said no and noted that, although the city of Akron recently applied to the program, its application was not selected for funding.

#### IV. Old Business

#### A. CIC Bylaws Committee Recommendations

**Mr. C. Baker** summarized the history and purpose of the CIC Bylaws Steering Committee that was appointed in May. **Mr. C. Baker** said that the committee recommended various changes to the CIC as a means to encourage public participation.

Among the committee's recommendations were: suspending the committee's bylaws; discontinuing reliance upon *Robert's Rules of Order*; membership changes; establishing a CIC Steering Committee; adopting a quarterly meeting calendar; the scheduling of public meetings rather than the CIC for regionally significant amendments to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and the Regional Transportation Plan; and allotting time during CIC meetings for open discussion.

There was discussion regarding changes in the CIC membership requirements.

**Fred Wise** expressed support for the proposed quarterly meeting schedule, but asked whether CIC-related information could be distributed to the membership more frequently through email or a blog. **Mr. C. Baker** said that AMATS was investigating such digital options and other venues to disseminate information.

There was discussion regarding the CIC evolving to a more open-discussion format.

There was discussion regarding use of the AMATS web site as a means to encourage CIC participation.

#### **Motion**

**Dustin J. Baker** made a motion to suspend the AMATS Citizens Involvement Committee Bylaws until December 2015 until further review can be made whether or not to continue with the new format or return to the old and it was seconded by **William J. Maki**. The motion was approved by a voice vote. **Mr. C. Baker** said that the Staff would seek input from the CIC soon with regards as to how to improve the committee's advertising and social media outreach.

There was discussion about outreach to minority populations within the Greater Akron area and potential topics of interest.

#### V. New Business

**Mr. Maki** asked how AMATS will use the \$580,000 that it will receive as a result of the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) *MPO Program Carryover Reduction Policy* as mentioned in Attachment 3C - AMATS Federal Funds Report.

Mr. C. Baker explained that AMATS was one of three metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs) in Ohio that successfully carried forward less funding than the established ODOT thresholds. Mr. C. Baker said that the remaining MPOs that exceeded the thresholds had their funds recalled and redistributed to the MPOs that met ODOT policy. Mr. C. Baker said that this redistribution amounted to an additional \$580,000 to AMATS. Mr. C. Baker noted, however, that AMATS is currently over-programmed in terms of project years and has a negative project funding balance. The net result of the redistributed \$580,000 is to reduce AMATS' negative balance.

**Mr. Maki** asked if the funding would be used for a specific project. **Mr. C. Baker** said no and that it would be applied to the general balance and used as needed. **Mr. Maki** asked if it would be applied to a particular fiscal year. **Mr. C. Baker** said that it would likely be used during Fiscal Year 2016.

**Mr. Maki** said that he would contact the Staff regarding the source of funding for the White Pond Parkway project (PID# 99051) as listed in Attachment 6A - Resolution 2014-16.

There was discussion regarding the bus vehicle purchases listed in Attachment 6B-Resolution 2014-17.

**Mr. Maki** presented information in a recent article citing statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration regarding the costs of crashes to the Greater Akron area in terms of loss of life, injuries, damages and economic loss.

**Mr. C. Baker** presented Attachment 5B - Adopting the AMATS Mid-Block Crossing Analysis. There was discussion regarding the analysis.

**Mr. Maki** said that he recently attended a Local Public Agency (LPA) Planning Conference in Rootstown. **Mr. Maki** shared information from the conference regarding the state's Simplified Bridge Process. There was discussion regarding the conference. **Mr. Maki** encouraged the members to

attend future LPA conferences. **Mr. Maki** referred to literature from the conference regarding Summit County's Draft Access Management Plan, site review plans and *Access Ohio 2040*.

**Joel Helms** praised Michael Ondecker for his service as CIC chairperson.

There was discussion regarding the AMATS Annual Meeting in October and its theme of the importance of place.

A question was asked as to when AMATS would host a *Better Block* event. **Mr. C. Baker** said that an event is tentatively scheduled for May 16, 2015. **Rick Stockburger** said that the event will take place in Akron's North Hill area and that a recent participation meeting for the event drew about 100 people.

**Mr. Stockburger** said that he would be leading a neighborhood walk through Akron's Firestone Park area on Dec. 20.

#### VI. Adjournment

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned.

#### FY 2016-2017 Lockdown

ODOT has officially locked down the projects that are scheduled to sell in FY 2016 and 2017. For FY 2016, the lockdown date is the actual date the project needs to sell by and for FY 2017 the projects are locked down by the quarter in which it is to sell. AMATS funded projects included in the lockdown are listed in the attached funding program table.

As we have seen in FY 2014, our collective efforts in successfully delivering that years' projects resulted in AMATS receiving an additional \$580,000. These additional funds were redistributed from other MPOs who did not deliver their projects on time. Therefore, it is imperative that we are diligent in keeping our projects on schedule so that we can continue to demonstrate our area's need of federal funds and our ability to deliver.

#### Statewide CMAQ Funding Program

Final project funding approvals from the statewide CMAQ Program Committee were made last month in December. Out of the \$400 million of requested funds, \$120 million was approved for projects including the top three prioritized projects from the AMATS area. Formal MPO approval of these projects is included in this months' agenda.

#### New TIP for Fiscal Years 2016-2019

The TIP will include all federally funded projects scheduled for implementation in fiscal years 2016 through 2019. A first draft of the list of projects will be prepared for the January Committee meetings for approval. A second draft will be completed and a public involvement period will follow. The final version of the complete TIP document will be presented for approval in May 2015.

The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is a comprehensive listing of transportation projects that are scheduled to receive federal funds in the next four years. The program includes projects from all modes of transportation including highways, public transportation or transit, bicycles and pedestrians.

The TIP is important because it provides a schedule by which to coordinate projects among jurisdictions and transportation agencies; is used as a guide for the implementation of short and long range transportation planning; is an aid to financial programming and administration; and is a source of information for the public. No project can be implemented with federal transportation funds unless it is included in the TIP.

The Staff began the development of the FY 2016-2019 TIP in December of 2014 by reviewing, exchanging and coordinating project information with the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT). The following dates highlight the remaining schedule in the FY 2016-2019 TIP development process:

Two-Week Public Comment Period on Final Draft TIP	March 30 – April 10
Final FY 2016-2019 TIP submitted to ODOT	April 27
Approval of Final TIP by AMATS Policy Committee	May 14

Approval of FY 2016-2019 TIP from FHWA/FTA June 30

The TIP contains two main sections of project listings – highway (which includes bike and pedestrian projects) and transit. The remainder of this memorandum includes information for each of these sections.

### **FY 2016-2019 TIP** – First Draft

#### **Highway Projects Section**

Federal funds for highway projects are allocated to ODOT, the County Engineers Association of Ohio (CEAO) and local Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) such as AMATS. ODOT and the CEAO are required to seek concurrence with the local MPO before a project can be listed in the TIP. The following text discusses federally funded transportation projects programmed by each of these agencies.

#### **ODOT Projects**

Various federal programs provide allocations of funds directly to ODOT. The listing of ODOT sponsored projects shown in Table H-3 was provided by ODOT Districts 3 and 4. The project costs, funding sources, and other associated data on some of these projects is not yet finalized and will be updated as additional information from ODOT is received.

In addition to funding available through federal programs, ODOT implements many projects through state funded programs. The majority of the funding available through this program is set aside for two lane and four lane resurfacing. These projects are listed on the Statewide Line Item table.

#### **County Engineers Association Projects**

All counties in Ohio receive an annual allocation of Surface Transportation Program (STP) and Bridge Replacement/Rehabilitation (BR) federal funds. The CEAO members have elected to pool these allocations and allow individual counties to compete for funds on a project-by-project basis. STP and BR projects approved by the CEAO for Portage, Summit and the Chippewa and Milton Townships area of Wayne County are also included in Table H-3.

#### **AMATS Projects**

The AMATS Policy Committee receives annual allocations of federal funds. Although AMATS has direct control of the projects selected to receive those funds, ODOT must concur. Annual allocations of federal funds are received through the Surface Transportation Program (STP) and Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP). Table H-3 also includes these projects funded with AMATS suballocated funds.

Attached to this memo is Table H-3, which provides a first draft listing of all highway projects to be included in the FY 2016-2019 TIP. Also attached is the Statewide Line Item list which indicates which projects will be constructed in the AMATS area but will utilize an individual statewide line item for purposes of approval and changes. These projects will not be included in Table H-3 and will not need TIP amendments but are still recognized as projects eligible for federal funds.

#### **Transit Projects Section**

The primary source of funds for transit projects is the Federal Transit Administration's Section 5307 Urbanized Area Formula Program and Section 5339 Bus and Bus Facilities Program. Each of the nation's urbanized areas receives an annual apportionment from these programs. Currently, the Akron Urbanized Area apportionment is mainly utilized by METRO and PARTA. In addition, METRO and PARTA also receive a share of the Cleveland Urbanized Area's Section 5307 and Section 5339 funds for services that operate in the northern part of Summit and Portage Counties.

The attached Table T-2 (two pages) is the main component of the Transit Projects section of the FY 2016-2019 TIP. This table is a comprehensive listing of all transit projects scheduled to use federal funds in FY 2016 through FY 2019. The development of this table was based on:

- 1. A forecast of federal funds based on the FFY 2014 FTA Section 5307 and Section 5339 apportionments.
- 2. A review of the *Transportation Outlook* recommendations

A large portion of the federal funds programmed in the First Draft TIP for METRO and PARTA are for the purchase of replacement buses. Preventive Maintenance expenses are another major project for both transit operators.

#### Future Project Updates

The Highway and Transit tables will be updated as additional information is received from the project sponsors. A second draft of these revised tables will be presented to the AMATS Committees for approval at their meetings in March. **DATE:** January 14, 2015

A draft Transportation Planning Work Program and Budget is submitted annually to ODOT for review. The Work Program identifies the planning activities that will take place in the upcoming fiscal year and describes the funding sources that will be used to pay for them. Once ODOT completes its review of the Work Program, it is presented to the Policy Committee for final adoption in May.

The major source of funding for activities listed in the Work Program is United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) Consolidated Planning funding. Other sources of revenue include federal Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality (CMAQ) funds, as well as state and local funds.

It has been estimated that \$1,076,825 in federal Consolidated Planning Grant (CPG) funds will be available to AMATS for planning activities in FY 2016. These funds must be matched by state and local funds at a percentage rate of 80/10/10, yielding a total FY 2016 budget of \$1,346,031. Remaining funds from this fiscal year (FY 2015) will be carried over on July 1, and may be used through December 31, 2015.

The local match for FY 2016 is calculated to be \$153,333, which also includes local share funds to be used in matching federal CMAQ dollars as part of the Rideshare and Air Quality Programs.

Table 1 shows the draft local share calculation for each individual member of AMATS. Each member's contribution is based on the dues structure established by the Policy Committee in 2005. The dues structure is based on population. Local share amounts were modified following the release of the 2010 Census figures in February 2011.

As a result, the FY 2016 per capita assessment for each community has been set at \$0.217. In addition, METRO and PARTA will be assessed collectively \$25,000.

Table 2 shows the work elements and major planning tasks for FY 2016. Key activities include:

- Maintaining the new Transportation Improvement Program (FY 2016-2019) as amended
- A Study of Future Traffic Congestion
- Bicycle, Pedestrian, Freight and Public Transit Plans
- Participating in the Statewide CMAQ Discretionary Funds Program
- Directing the Rideshare and Air Quality Advocacy Programs
- Developing a System Preservation Needs Report
- Integrating performance measures as part of the Plan and TIP processes consistent with MAP-21

Table 3 summarizes all funds budgeted in the Work Program by source. The staff is programming \$48,000 in Supplemental Planning funds for the integration of performance measures as part of the planning process following the passage of Map-21. These funds will be matched by Toll Revenue Credit, per ODOT instruction. No local share is needed for this line item. Also included in Table 3 are planning activities performed by METRO and PARTA.

The Staff is requesting approval of the draft *FY 2016 Transportation Planning Work Program and Budget* and asks for permission to submit it to ODOT for review. The Staff will then meet with ODOT in April to discuss any comments. A final version of the Work Program will be submitted for Policy Committee approval in May.

#### Background

In 2013, ODOT notified the Ohio Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) of a significant change to the management of the Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality (CMAQ) funding program. ODOT was requiring that the individual MPO CMAQ programs be combined into a single statewide program. This directive was in response to the large balances that MPOs were consistently carrying forward each year.

#### **Funding Process**

To manage this new program, a statewide CMAQ Program Committee was formed consisting of representatives from the Ohio MPOs. For the first step in this new process, the statewide CMAQ Program Committee was tasked to develop the program's policies, procedures and project selection criteria. The new CMAQ Program Policy was finalized and approved in early 2014. Project solicitation began at each of the individual MPOs in May of 2014.

AMATS project applications were due at the end of June. The TAC TIP Subcommittee met several times to review the eleven project applications that were submitted for funding and to develop a prioritized list of projects to be sent to the Statewide CMAQ Program Committee for further consideration. The AMATS Policy ratified this list of prioritized projects in September of 2014.

#### Funding Approval

The statewide CMAQ Program Committee compiled all projects submitted from around the state which included over 100 projects requesting \$400 million in funding. The Committee met several times to evaluate and rank each project based on the approved program funding policy. In the final ranking, approximately \$120 million in projects was awarded funding.

The top three prioritized projects from AMATS were approved for funding and include Tall-madge Road in Brimfield Township, PARTA and METRO's bus purchases and Streetsboro Signal Upgrade. PARTA and METRO's bus purchases will be split in two projects for ease of funding.

#### **Staff Comments**

CMAQ funding for the AMATS area projects have been approved by the CMAQ Program Committee for FY 2018 and 2019. Both of these years are beyond the current FY 2014-2017 TIP so these projects will be added to the new FY 2016-2019 TIP which is currently being developed.

As part of the development of the new FY 2016-2019 TIP, these projects will undergo public involvement and be analyzed for financial constraint, environmental justice, air quality and consistency with the Regional Transportation Plan.

#### Recommendation

Attached to this memo is Resolution Number 2015-01 approving these projects to be funded under the CMAQ funding program. The TAC TIP Subcommittee and the Staff recommend approval.

Construction is scheduled in FY 2016 using \$1,556,600 in Discretionary Funds and \$1,633,400 in local funds.

#### STAFF COMMENTS

As with all TIP amendments, considerations with respect to public participation, financial capability, air quality, environmental justice and Plan consistency are important.

Sufficient funding is forecasted from federal and state sources for this amendment. Inter-agency consultation determined that this amendment remains in conformance with the Cleveland-Akron area's air quality requirements. This new project meets all remaining amendment requirements mentioned above. Therefore, this amendment does not cause any negative impact.

The following requests have been made to amend the TIP FY 2014-2017:

#### New Project

**SR 604** – is a new resurfacing project in Ashland and Wayne Counties. The portion in Wayne County runs through Milton and Chippewa Townships. Construction is scheduled in FY 2016 using \$531,200 in federal funds and \$1,026,400 in state funds.

#### **Revise Funding**

**Frost Road** – transfer \$315,000 of Highway Safety Improvement Program funds from engineering to new right-of-way phase in FY2015 and add \$450,000 of state funds to supplement local share of construction phase.

**SR 18** – increase federal and state funding for construction in FY 2016 by \$2,360,000.

#### **Combine Projects**

**SR 91/SR 303 and SR 91/Norton Rd** – will be combined into one project with construction scheduled in FY 2016.

#### **STAFF COMMENTS**

As with all TIP amendments, considerations with respect to public participation, financial capability, air quality, environmental justice and Plan consistency are important. Sufficient funding is forecasted from federal and state sources for this amendment. The new as well as the existing projects listed meet all amendment requirements mentioned above. Therefore this amendment does not cause any negative impact.

#### **Executive Summary**

This memorandum discusses an amendment to the FY 2015 program of projects for METRO RTA to add funding for facility construction.

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) has awarded METRO funding through its Ohio Transit Preservation Partnership Program (OTPPP). This competitive grant program was established to provide additional capital funding to Ohio's public transit operators for projects emphasizing system preservation.

The source of these funds is state-attributable Surface Transportation Program (STP) funds. This program is administered by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The funds will then be flexed over to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) for METRO's use.

METRO has requested that additional funds be added to FY 2015 of the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to include a recently awarded OTPPP funded project. These funds will be used for the construction of a bus storage canopy for covered parking for METRO's paratransit bus fleet.

METRO is requesting the following changes to the TIP:

#### - Add Capital Funds for the Construction of a Bus Storage Canopy

METRO requests the addition of \$1,750,000 in FY 2015 for the construction of a bus storage canopy at their central facility on Kenmore Boulevard. This project will be funded at 80% federal share (\$1,400,000), derived from state attributable STP funds.

#### **STAFF COMMENTS**

As with all TIP amendments, considerations with respect to consistency with the Regional Transportation Plan, financial capability, air quality conformity, public involvement, and environmental justice are important.

#### **Regional Transportation Plan**

The project proposed in this amendment is consistent with *Transportation Outlook*, the area's Regional Transportation Plan.

#### **Financial Capability**

With respect to financial capability, there are sufficient funds available for this amendment.

#### **Air Quality**

The project can be viewed as either exempt from air quality or has been analyzed as part of the air quality networks and has resulted in a finding of compliance with the Clean Air Act. Therefore, this amendment will not affect adversely the air quality conformity approval of *Transportation Outlook* or the TIP.

#### **Public Involvement**

The Staff is recommending that the Policy Committee consider this action as not regionally significant. As a result, the modified procedures in the AMATS *Public Participation Plan* are appropriate. These procedures include presenting the amendment for comment at a Citizens Involvement Committee (CIC) meeting. If any comments are received at the January 22, 2015, CIC meeting, they will be presented to the Policy Committee at its January 29, 2015, meeting.

#### **Environmental Justice**

Executive Order 12898: Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low Income Populations states that, "each federal agency shall make achieving environmental justice part of its mission by identifying and addressing as appropriate, disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects of its programs policies and activities on minority and low-income populations." This requirement also applies to recipients of federal funds, such as METRO RTA.

The project that will result from this TIP amendment does not appear to impose disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects on minorities and/or low-income people who reside in the METRO service area.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Attached to this memo is Resolution 2015-04. This resolution approves the requested changes to FY 2015 of the TIP as described above. The Staff recommends approval.
